




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QUESTION 1: A patient presents with the following ECG. What is the most CORRECT diagnosis?

- I. "Coarse" atrial fibrillation.
- 2. Sinus rhythm.
- 3. Counter-clockwise typical right atrial flutter with variable AV block.
- 4. Focal atrial tachycardia with variable AV block.
- 5. Clockwise reverse typical right atrial flutter with variable AV block.

QUESTION 2: He has had palpitations for a few weeks. He has a structurally normal heart. What is the next step in management?

- 1. Carotid sinus massage.
- 2. Intravenous adenosine bolus to assist in diagnosis and to terminate the tachycardia.
- 3. Synchronised DC cardioversion.
- 4. Intravenous Amiodarone.
- 5. Rate control with beta-blockers and consider anticoagulation.
